FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Do Educators in OSHC need to have a qualification?

• Regulations state that Educators working in OSHC do not need formal qualifications. At Adventure Patch, we consider a variety of reasons, including qualifications, as to why someone would make a good Educator. These include life experiences, attitude to learn, and other transferable skills someone may have. We pride ourselves on supporting Educators to gain qualifications and offer many professional development opportunities to develop Educators as people and Carers.

What will happen if my child forgets go to OSHC after school?

• If your child has not arrived at OSHC, we will make inquiries with the school and ring parents/families to make sure your child is safe. We ask that you notify us of any absences.

When do Vacation Care programs go out to families?

• Vacation Care programs are typically released to families three weeks prior to the commencement of school holidays. An Xplor post will be sent to all families letting them know that the program is now available and mobile bookings have opened.

How do you work with schools to ensure the upkeep of buildings?

• Many of the buildings that we operate from are leased from the school (mainly Department of Education) so we need to work in collaboration with each school to ensure the buildings are safe and in good repair.
